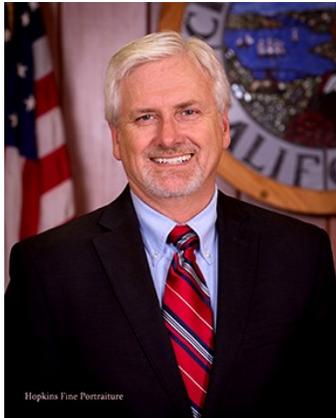

City Manager's Column



The November election ballot is loaded with a large number of important issues, from selecting a President, a new US Senator, legalized cannabis, city council elections and ballot questions. All of these decisions are important and will have an impact on the country, the state, and Eureka. One ballot question that can easily be overlooked is Measure U, the ½ cent, county-wide Transportation Tax. This is a sales tax that will raise approximately \$10 million a year, with \$3.3 million allocated to Eureka. Currently, Eureka relies on state gas tax funds to fund road maintenance. Unfortunately, this revenue source has been decreasing over the past several years due to higher fuel efficient vehicles

and reduced driving.

However, the city's lack of funding for street maintenance is not the result of a few years of reduced gas tax dollars. The problem has been long term—at least thirty years, and the 2008 recession exacerbated the problem. The result has been potholes followed by pothole repairs on top of pothole repairs, broken up asphalt on streets, and a general falling apart of our roadways. In particular, many low use residential streets, as well as major commercial streets such as Hawthorne that have a high level of heavy truck traffic have suffered severely over time.

The solution to improving streets in Eureka and throughout the county is a dedicated funding source for transportation. As public education materials are developed, please take the time to read through the information and make your own determination about the ½ cent sales tax. And, most important of all—Get Out and Vote!






Measure U 5 Year Street Maintenance Comparison


Example of a neighborhood street maintenance project

200 Abandoned Vehicles... Going, Going, Gone

On August 22nd the Eureka Police Department's volunteer abatement team reached a milestone by towing their 200th abandoned vehicle off the streets of Eureka.

The morning's tow of a dumped van, had had been parked on the 100 block of Second Street for several days. Business owners expressed concern of the vehicle's overdue status on the streets of Old Town. Subjects had been seen trying to break in to the vehicle and it was a nuisance to the area.

EPD's Vehicle Abatement Team was formed to combat the large number of vehicles, including motorhomes, travel trailers, boats, and wrecked cars, abandoned on the streets of Eureka.

"In its conception, I was just hoping to relieve some blight that had accumulated around the city and to silence some of the complaints we were receiving concerning abandoned vehicles," stated EPD Captain Brian Stephens. "Eight months, 200 towed vehicles, and over 900 volunteered hours later, I am truly indebted to the work of our Vehicle Abatement Volunteers. The difference they have made in the quality of life for our residents, businesses and those who shop and recreate in the city is profound and truly amazing." Captain Stephens went on to say, "I truly cannot thank them enough for their service to this city and to our department. Their enthusiasm and incredible work ethic is contagious. They do all of this with a smile!"

January 5, 2016 marked the first day on the job for this dynamic volunteer vehicle abatement team staffed by local citizens Debby Brantley, Dave Startare, and Roger Miller. This dedicated team has donated well over 400 hours of their time to clean up the streets of Eureka in the past eight months.

"Elizabeth Andrews once said, 'Volunteers don't have the time; they just have the heart.' Our vehicle abatement team has heart," remarked Chief Andrew Mills. "They have the heart to get the job done and done correctly. They have the will to see Eureka improve and become the great city it is. They have the desire to step outside of their comfort zone and learn new tasks and deliver a great service. Two hundred vehicles abated is an important milestone. Congratulations."

The officers and civilian staff of the Eureka Police Department proudly applauds the hard work and tenacity the Abatement Team has exhibited. They truly make the streets of Eureka a more beautiful place.





Wildland Fire Season is Here!!!

Humboldt Bay Fire has been busy this summer with wildland fires. Not only have there been a number of vegetation fires within our own area, but we have sent two of our engines and Strike Team Leaders to aid in some of the larger, high profile fires elsewhere in the state.

Locally we have seen an increase in vegetation fires with the largest fires occurring along the waterfront grasses and in the greenbelts. A number of those incidents had fire behavior that would be expected inland, but is occurring here with the dry fuel beds. The largest fire occurred at the foot of T Street and totaled just over three acres by the time it was completely extinguished.

On July 22nd the “Soberanes Fire” in Monterey County erupted and Humboldt Bay Fire was requested to respond to the incident. Two Battalion Chiefs from Humboldt Bay Fire responded, leading two Humboldt Bay Fire engines with six personnel, as well as three other Humboldt County fire agency engines to the blaze. The Humboldt Bay Fire resources remained committed to the incident through August 14th. Humboldt Bay Fire personnel were involved with structure protection, construction of containment and control lines, extinguishment and mop up of areas. The fire is now nearly 90,000 acres with about 60% containment.

While the Humboldt Bay Fire resources were fighting the fire in Southern California, many other HBF personnel covered the stations here at home for as many as five 24-hour days straight before they were relieved. Once our personnel and resources returned from the “Soberanes Fire” they returned to their normal shifts until the next mutual aid request.

In addition to the “Soberanes Fire”, our personnel have also staffed our two four-wheel drive wildland engines and covered the Humboldt Cal-Fire stations while their resources were committed to other incidents and operational areas throughout the state. At the time of this article, the two Humboldt Bay Fire wildland engines were committed to Cal Fire for coverage and fighting the “Tully” incident in Weitchpec.

As we progress through the fire season, Humboldt Bay Fire wants everyone to recognize that this fire season is shaping up to be a busy one. Fuel moistures are consistent with what is found at the end of the fire season. This means larger fires can spread through the fuels much faster. Please use caution when engaged in activities that could lead to a vegetation fire, such as using barbecues, riding off-road vehicles and even utilizing lawn equipment. Every resource that is committed away from our home unit, puts additional strain on the local resources. Although we are able to cover all of our stations, it leaves us short on larger incidents or multiple incidents at the same time. Please be safe.

2-1-1 For all Homeless Assessment and Referrals for Humboldt County

Just Dial “2-1-1” for More Information

The Coordinated Entry Lead for Humboldt County is 2-1-1. 2-1-1 is the connection between the homeless and their providers to determine placement into available housing programs throughout Humboldt County. Through a grant from HUD, within the Continuum of Care in Humboldt County, 2-1-1 will be prescreening individuals who call in (either on their own or through a service provider) to determine those that are at most need for assistance through the use of a universal prescreening tool. They will then be placed on a list to either be placed in the next available program bed or assisted in getting their own permanent housing. If you, or a loved one, are in need of low income housing lists, information about transitional housing, food, child care, parenting classes, after-school programs for children, access programs for low income families (such as free tax preparation [VITA]), local clinics and hospitals, help with out-of-the-area doctor’s appointments, need to connect to mental health and additional resources, such as counseling, drug and alcohol programs, and safe and sober housing, support for seniors, and persons with disabilities, and more, please give them a call.



Learning About the Job Market

What is the role of the Job Market? Who runs it?

The Job Market is a consortium of agencies who work together to extend assistance to job seekers who are actively looking for work and for businesses who need to hire good people, to increase the skills of current employees, or who need special assistance to avert staff layoff or business closure.

The Job Market has a wide variety of operators, and all are there to serve employers and job seekers in our community. The main operators are College of the Redwoods, Employment Training Division and Redwood Coast Action Agency (RCAA). Additional partners are: Employment Development Dept. (EDD), Dept. of Rehabilitation, Experience Works, TANF, North Coast Small Business Development Center, and Sequoia Personnel.

Who does the Job Market serve?

The Job Market provides comprehensive job search assistance including access to computers and job listings; resume, interviewing, and skills identification workshops; and 1-on-1 expert vocational counseling for career planning and re-training for qualifying individuals. For lobby services (computers, job listings, resume copying & faxing) clients need a CalJOBS account (which can be done at The Job Market); for workshops and counseling, clients need to also attend a Job Market orientation.

There are also resources available for employers at the Job Market! Employers can take advantage of Labor market data, small business training, HR and employee training programs, hiring incentives, and assistance filling jobs.

The Job Market offers targeted services to veterans, youth, and seniors. Youth and seniors are targeted because those age groups in particular have been identified as having barriers to employment. As for veterans, the U.S. Department of Labor has implemented 'Priority of Service' for veterans and eligible spouses in One-Stop Centers nationwide and in all qualified job training programs.

VETERAN SERVICES

Veterans receive one-on-one assistance with vocational guidance and job search, workshops especially for veterans, and priority job referrals as well as referrals to other veteran services.

SENIOR SERVICES

The Experience Works Program Offers employment job readiness and search assistance, job placement, and subsidized wage programs for citizens 55 and over.

YOUTH SERVICES

The Job Market has two programs created for young adults: the Youth Employment Opportunity Program (YEOP) and the WIOA Youth Program. The YEOP provides services for youth 15-25 who are at risk of not achieving their educational goals, offering 1:1 peer advising, career assessment, job search assistance, assistance with applications and referral to education or suitable youth employment opportunities. The WIOA program also offers career guidance, support for educational and/or employment attainment, opportunities for skills training in in-demand industries and occupations, and temporary paid work experience opportunities for eligible young adults.

Can the Job Market help me, even if I'm not looking for a job?

Yes. The Job Market also offers community education—a wide variety of educational opportunities are held at The Job Market, including workshops on building a resume, computer training, and interview boot camp. Workshops are hosted by the County of Humboldt Employment Training Division and College of the Redwoods.

Get to Know a Zone District: RS-6000

Welcome to the first installment of our fourteen part series “Get to Know a Zone District.” In this series, a staff-member in the Planner Division answers questions about each Zoning District in the City. This month we will be exploring our largest and most commonly discussed Zone District – RS-6000.

What is RS-6000? What does it stand for?

Great question. The “RS” stands for “Residential Single-Family”. The 6000 refers to the minimum lot size, which is 6,000 square feet. This means that City regulations will not allow any lots in this zone to be less than 6,000 square feet in total area.

So this is the zone for single family homes?

Exactly. This is a zone that was created for single family homes and complementary uses such as garages, churches, and schools.

What about commercial uses, like banks and restaurants? Could those go in this zone?

Not under the current rules. This zone is all about maintaining a peaceful, quiet, low-density residential environment. However, City Council is currently entertaining a concept proposed by staff that would allow some existing or previously-existing neighborhood-scale commercial facilities to be located in the RS-6000 zone under limited circumstances. Examples of existing neighborhood-scale commercial facilities include Pat’ Market, Handee Market, Brick-and-Fire Bistro, and Harris & K Market. Each of these existing commercial facilities was made “non-conforming” under the 1966 Eureka Zoning Code, though they have been allowed to continue since then as “grandfathered.” The current proposal would reverse the 1966 decision and allow these residential markets to continue under limited circumstances.

What about home-based businesses? I knit baby hats and sell them online. Could I do that from my house in the RS-6000 zone?

Most likely, yes. There are certain home-based business types that are allowed in this zone. A person must get what is known as a “Home Occupation Permit” from the Development Services Department first, however. Not all businesses qualify; they must be low-key businesses that won’t disrupt the neighborhood. If the business creates addition noise, traffic, etc. it probably would not be allowed.

What about duplexes and apartment buildings? Are they allowed in this Zone?

Nope. Those uses are reserved for other, higher-density residential and commercial zones (which will be covered in a future newsletter).

What about Mother-in-law units? Are they allowed in this Zone?

Yes, with some limitations. Mother-in-law units, or Secondary Dwelling Units (SDUs) as we call them, are permitted. The most a property owner would be able to have on their lot in this zone would be a single family home with a mother-in-law unit (assuming there was enough space on the lot to meet the City’s requirements).

Wait. A Mother-in-Law suite sounds a lot like a second unit. You just said that you can’t have duplexes in the RS-6000 zone. What’s the deal with that?

Astute observation. Our zoning code makes a distinction between a “Second Unit” and a “Secondary (Dwelling) Unit”. The main difference is that a Secondary Dwelling Unit can be no larger than 640 s.f., whereas a Second Unit may be the same size as the primary unit (for example, 1,500 s.f.).

Get to Know a Zone District: RS-6000 Continued...

Interesting. How can I find out if I can build a Mother-in-Law suite (SDU) on my property? Is there anything else I need to know?

As a general rule, most properties in the RS-6000 zone can accommodate a Secondary Dwelling Unit (SDU). There are other requirements that must be met as well, such as setbacks, height limits, additional off-street parking, etc.. Please contact the Development Services Department (441-4160) to discuss the particulars of your property.

I want to build a detached garage for Betty, my '64 Pontiac GTO. That ol' girl is suh-weet!

Cool, Cool. Sounds like a nice ride. Did you have a question?

Yeah, sorry. What are the setbacks for a garage?

Five feet from the rear, and five feet from the sides (assuming you have a 20' wide alley behind your property) for a detached garage.

Great! That's easy enough to remember. What about fences?

If the fence is under 6' tall you don't need a building permit, or any other kind of permit from the City. Just please make sure that you don't build it in the road right-of-way or on your neighbor's property.

What else can you tell me about this district?

At nearly 1,300 acres, the RS-6000 zone is the largest zone in the City. It also currently includes just under 8,000 residential structures and is home to the majority of Eureka's population.

Where can I get more information about other zoning stuff?

The Development Services Department (and Planning Division) is open Monday-Friday 8am to 5pm (closed from noon-1:00) at City Hall. Stop by or call 441-4160 to speak with a planner.

Parklets

As a reminder to those who don't remember, a "parklet" is a mini-park (approximately 8 feet wide by 20 feet long) that occupies one on-street parking space in order to provide space for public recreation and seating for private businesses. Parklets are effectively sidewalk extensions that extend out from the sidewalk at the level of the sidewalk.

In August of 2015, the Eureka City Council approved the construction of four parklets in Old Town and also approved an 18-month parklet pilot program to evaluate them. Since that time all four parklets have been constructed and are now operational: Ramone's Bakery (209 E Street), Humboldt Bay Tourism Center (2nd and G Streets), A Taste of Bim (613 3rd Street), and The Siren's Song Tavern (352 2nd Street). Each parklet is different and designed with creativity and individual flair. It is important to note that the City has not invested any funds into the parklets associated with this pilot. All costs associated with the parklet pilot have been borne solely by the business owners, and the parklets are designed and permitted through a rigorous City process. The owners are also bound by an encroachment permit, parklet permit, and increased insurance limits to ensure the safety and comfort of users and surrounding businesses.

It is the intention of this pilot program to use the four parklets as test cases in order to determine if parklets are appropriate for Eureka. To evaluate the parklets, staff has three volunteers collecting data until the pilot period ends in February 2017. The volunteers are collecting information about the impacts to parking, the number of people using the parklets, and other similar information. Staff is evaluating the data, and updating the guidelines as needed.

In early 2017, staff will present the data to Council with a recommendation on how proceed with the parklet program. The options are: continue with the four approved parklets, repeat the RFP process to approve additional parklets, or discontinue the program. Staff has received multiple inquiries from businesses that are interested in participating in the program if Council chooses to continue the parklet program and increase the presence of parklets in Eureka.
